Goose Maintenance Program

The geese are coming back. I counted 12 pair on my last scouting trip around the lake. On one hand, it's a welcome sign that spring and summer are at hand, bringing all the fun activities that come with them. On the other, it reminds us of the work we need to do to minimize the negative impact that too many geese have on the quality of the summer experience.

Last year, we were unable to conduct the "Goose Roundup" due to Covid concerns. Luckily, our nest maintenance program greatly helped curb the goose population. We thank the folks at MDNR for their help carrying out these programs. This year we hope to be able to use both programs again. <u>Here's how you can help</u>:

- 1. Please scout the areas around your property and adjoining properties and report the location of any nesting couples you observe.
- 2. Volunteer to help with the "Goose Roundup". We need people on the lake to herd geese families to the collection site, scouts on the shore encouraging the families into the water, and volunteers to help set up and take down the collection site. This typically occurs mid-June.

Prominent Township Items

The Community Center (old school) has the Board's attention again. After considerable investments of time, money, meetings, and public surveys, the path forward is murky. On March 10, the Board voted 4-1 to hold another public workshop to explore options due to lack of Board consensus on building footprint, repair priorities, improvements, and budgeting. Preliminary costs for this building are substantial. In 2020, the township paid ~\$100,000 for highest priority roof repairs. Additional problems remain: the older section and its roof, out-of-code alarm system, heating, air conditioning, electrical and plumbing upgrades, Americans With Disability Act compliance, etc. It is unlikely that the Township budget could support, at least in the short term, baseline needs.

Crystal Township's contract for 40 hours/week of dedicated, **sheriff patrol** coverage was renewed intact for 2021. The August ballot will ask Crystal Township voters whether to renew this special coverage contract or not, given the increased, county-wide, sheriff millage passed in 2020.

The Board reopened the **retail marijuana** licensing window for 2/01-6/01/2021. Supervisor McCracken said the new owners of the property formerly known as Crystal ATV and Marine have indicated an interest. Lucky Buds, on Main St, is currently licensed for medical marijuana. The Board indicated that it has no current interest in expanding licensing to production facilities.

For the second time, the **Crystal Township Park** grant funding request was denied. Accordingly, the township will submit an improved application for a third time. The amount requested was \$300,000. The township committed \$100,000 from the general budget, while the remaining \$157,000 was to come from charitable and 'in kind' contributions.

Neighboring townships have scrambled to create zoning and ordinances as **wind turbines** have sprouted in their communities. Crystal Township has not, as of March, been contacted by Apex Clean Energy, the leading windmill project company in Montcalm County. Perhaps Crystal Township is not an ideal fit

Yes, can you believe it is almost that time? Our Crystal Lake fireworks display will be on July 4th as usual.

We are hoping to upgrade the show, but the ability to do so centers around upgrades to the barges. We are in the process of determining the best possible way to accomplish this. One option is to add another float tube to each existing barge to better support the load of the racks of tubes that hold and shoot the fireworks. Another option is to add another barge. Both options involve substantial rework of the barges to carry load higher out of the water for better support of the load and the pounding that the barges receive from the lift-off of each firework shell. The objective, of course, is to get the best fireworks show possible.

We hope that you will continue donations to the fireworks fund. For many years, we have funded the show completely on these donations. We appreciate you and hope you enjoy this year's show!



Boat Launch Parking Problem

At the July 2020 CLA Annual Meeting, membership requested the CLA Board revisit what can be done about North Shore DNR launch parking. During heavy traffic weekends and holidays, the parking lot is overcrowded and vehicles with trailers park along the roadsides and grassy curb areas near the area in violation of "No Parking" signs. Vehicles without trailers, parked in the boat launch lot, take valuable parking spaces. The Crystal Lake Association has made a request to the DNR to have Crystal Lake added to the following Land Use regulation:

USE ORDERS OF THE DIRECTOR By authority conferred on the Director of the Department of Natural Resources by Section 504 of the Natural Resources Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended, MCL 324.504, and in accordance with R 299.921 to R 299.933, the Director of the Department of Natural Resources orders the following:

2.106 Vehicle and trailer parking within certain access sites and harbors, prohibited conduct.

Order 2.106 A person shall not do any of the following:

Chapter (9) Park a motorized vehicle without a trailer attached in any area other than a parking space designated as "parking for vehicles without trailers" between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. on any Saturday, Sunday, or holiday on any of the following state-owned lands:

- (a) Lake Fenton boating access site 25-2, section 14, T5N R6E, Genesee county.
- (b) Little Whitefish lake boating access site 59-9, section 8, T11N R10W, Montcalm county.
- (c) Orchard lake boating access site 63-1, section 14, T2N R9E, Oakland county.
- (d) Union lake boating access site 63-2, section 1, T2N R8E, Oakland county.

Crystal is by far the largest lake in Montcalm County, yet this boat launch has no oversight on weekends and holidays. Something needs to be done as this has been an issue at the lake for years. Many recreational boaters cannot understand why Little Whitefish Lake is singled out in this Chapter for parking and Crystal is unregulated. The DNR says it does not have manpower to monitor this launch site and cannot delegate authority.

The Montcalm County Sheriff states they are unable to issue citations for parking violations in the boat launch parking area as it is State land. The DNR is calling the Sheriff to confirm they can, however, issue citations for those vehicles parking along the roadside at the boat launch where "No Parking" signs are posted.

As the DNR stated, the wheel turns slowly, so action to include Crystal Lake in the Land Use Regulations may not be accomplished by this summer. They have requested pictures when parking along the roadway occurs and vehicles without trailers are parked in the boat launch parking lot. Please forward pictures to the CLA Facebook page and we will relay to our DNR contact. Your help will speed this issue through the correct DNR channels.

Water Quality Report – March 2021

After last year's water quality monitoring hiatus, we will resume our program this year. Due to a state budget impasse, the 2020 program was suspended but funds have now been restored. We are enrolled in the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) for phosphorous, chlorophyll, and Secchi disk clarity measurements. The program is supported by the Michigan Lakes and Streams Association (MLSA) and coordinates with the Michigan DNR and EGLE departments.

MLSA will hold its annual conference, virtually, on April 29th and 30th. The conference includes refresher training for lake monitoring followed by informational webinars.

Spring Total Phosphorous was sampled on March 23rd, after the ice went out. As the nutrient that leads to

algae growth, we need to learn whether it was phosphorous or was heavy rain, sunshine and warm water that caused last year's algae blooms. Additionally, on a monthly basis from May through September we will sample chlorophyll to measure the level of algae and other micro-organisms. On a weekly basis, we will measure water clarity with the Secchi disk. Comparing our data to that of prior years and data from other lakes will let us know if we have a developing problem.

Surveying the lake for aquatic invasive species, primarily Eurasian water milfoil and starry stonewort, will also occur. Last September we identified and treated a few problem areas, hopefully preventing a return of these intruders this year. The survey will be arranged for June with treatment if necessary, to follow.

Night Boating Safety - It's About Proper Lights and Attention

The Handbook of Michigan Boating Laws and Responsibilities by the Michigan DNR is widely available in paperback and on the DNR website. Under *Nighttime Navigation,* we are to "be on the lookout for the lights of other vessels when boating at night."

- <u>Sidelights</u>, red port/left and green starboard/right are to be visible to approaching vessels from the side and head-on.
- <u>Sternlight</u>, white is to be seen from behind the vessel.
- <u>Masthead Light</u>, white shining forward and to both sides is required on all power-driven vessels and must be displayed when under engine power. The absence of this light indicates a sailboat under sail. (NOT docking lights).
- <u>All-Around White Light</u> on power driven vessels <39.4 ft may be used to combine a Masthead Light and a Sternlight into a single white light that can be seen by other vessels in any direction (360 degrees). This also serves as an anchor light when not underway and when sidelights are extinguished.

Michigan law requires "if underway between sunset and sunrise or periods of reduced visibility, vessels must be equipped and exhibit navigation lights."

For boats <26 ft, (a) red and green sidelights must be visible from a distance of at least one mile and (b) an all-around white light must be visible from a distance of at least two miles and must be higher than the sidelights. The DNR advises displaying a white light whenever anchored or adrift at night.

Further rules for encountering vessels at night, including special rules for sailboats also exist. From *Night Boating... A Whole New Ballgame* by Commander Bob Admin, June 19, 2020 (*thank you Crystal Lake Yacht Club - Marina Facebook postings*)

"A night cruise can be one of the most relaxing and enjoyable pleasures of boating...[but it requires] special attention from the skipper. You can't see where you are, you can't see where you've been, and you can't see where you're going... There is a natural tendency... to want to use a search light or spotlight at night just as one would use headlights on a car. But...headlights would be of little use...because boating is three dimensional. Automobile drivers don't have to be concerned with what lies beneath their highways, but boaters must. Also, a spotlight shining on waves creates shadows and reflections that can look like fishing boats or debris... [T]he biggest reason we don't have headlights or use our searchlights for nighttime running is that we would temporarily blind other boaters...we're all handicapped...operating at night...we just don't see well in the dark ...

[B]asic principles of boating after dark:

- Slow down. You cannot judge distances at night easily...you'll need time to figure out what all the lights mean, that are moving at different speeds, directions and distances relative to your own boat.
- Arrange your interior lighting so that you are not blinded by your own illumination.
- Use your hearing to your best advantage. Sound carries across water...If your...stereo system is on full blast, you might miss important clues given by approaching vessels such as engine noise, horns, rushing water, sails flapping or even loud conversation."

Safety Tips for All to Know

From the Dept. of Natural Resources, Michigan Dept. of Transportation, and Friendly Neighbors

BOATERS — Know & follow the rules of navigation


PEDESTRIANS — Walk/run on the side of the road as far to the left as possible *AGAINST* oncoming traffic, where there are no sidewalks.

BICYCLISTS — Always ride *WITH* other traffic.

DRIVERS — Leave at least 3 feet of space between your vehicle and a bicyclist when passing.

PROPERTY TIPS — Before leaving for the week:

- Take care with placing trash cans; they may get knocked over if too close to the road.
- Raise watercraft high and secure kayaks, water toys, umbrellas etc. to protect against high water/wind losses.

for wind-driven energy development, but Crystal's lack of any zoning and wind ordinances creates 'wild west' vulnerabilities. The township will not hire outside specialists to draft an ordinance but may look at the Bloomer Township ordinance as a template. To be continued!
